Toll Public Interest Center Philadelphia Fellowship

Penn Law is committed to supporting its students who seek public interest careers. To that end, the **Toll Public Interest Center Philadelphia Fellowship** will be awarded to a recent graduate of Penn Law for a one-year term beginning in August, in order to help the Philadelphia Fellow launch a public interest career in Philadelphia. Penn Law graduates may apply for this Fellowship in the spring of their last year of law school or at the conclusion of a judicial clerkship.

The Toll Public Interest Center Philadelphia Fellowship is designed to bridge the Toll Public Interest Center to Philadelphia's vibrant public interest community. The fellow's time will be split between serving clients at a local public interest organization and working with Penn Law students at the Toll Public Interest Center (TPIC). Fellows will work half time at a local public interest organization¹ of their choosing (fellows must secure their own partnership with the organization). Both the fellow and the organization must be located in Philadelphia. The fellow's time at TPIC will focus on strengthening the pro bono program at Penn Law. The fellow will counsel students regarding pro bono opportunities, help to prepare students for their pro bono work, and cultivate new opportunities for students in Philadelphia. Through his or her dual responsibilities, the fellow will be well-positioned to act as a liaison between TPIC and the Philadelphia public interest community. Applications are due February 28, 2011, and a fellow will be selected by April 1, 2011 by Toll Public Interest Center Advisory Board members. The fellowship carries a stipend of \$42,500 plus benefits (to be provided through the sponsoring organization). Recipients are also eligible for the *Penn Law Toll Loan Repayment Assistance Program (TollRAP)*.

Application Procedure

Applications must be received electronically (PDF preferred) no later than **Monday, February 28, 2011 at 5:00 p.m.** Email the application to tor@law.upenn.edu. Late applications will not be considered.

Complete applications will include the following:

1. An Application Cover Page.
2. A current résumé.
3. A personal statement (no more than 3 double spaced pages) that describes your relevant experience, interests, future goals with respect to public interest work, and any other reasons the committee should consider awarding you this fellowship.
4. A description of your partnering organization that details its mission and work, a description of the work you propose to perform for that organization, and a proposed part-time work schedule.

¹ A "public interest" organization is defined as: any nonprofit organization or institution whose primary purpose is to serve or advocate on behalf of individuals or organizations whose interests, for various economic, political or social reasons, are not adequately represented by the private sector or the government. The fellow's work with the organization must also be "law-related" insofar as it substantially utilizes the legal training and skills of the graduate and must principally and directly benefit underrepresented individuals.

5. One letter of support from your sponsoring organization, and two letters of recommendation from professors or past employers who can speak to your work in public interest.

The Advisory Board Fellowship Selection Committee will review all applications and select applicants they wish to interview. Interviews will be scheduled in March, and a Fellow will be selected by April 1, 2011.
