Langer, Grogan and Diver Fellowship in Social Justice:

Penn Law is committed to supporting its students who seek to dedicate their careers to public interest law, and to supporting the greater Philadelphia community. To that end, through the generous support of its alumni at Langer, Grogan & Diver P.C., the Law School has established the **Langer, Grogan and Diver Fellowship in Social Justice**, which funded its first Fellow in the fall of 2010. Through this Fellowship, Penn Law seeks to help the Fellow launch a public interest career representing low-income, unrepresented communities in the Delaware Valley.¹ Penn Law graduates may apply for this Fellowship in the spring of their last year of law school or at the conclusion of a judicial clerkship.

The Fellowship is for a one-year term beginning in August or September 2011. The fellow will design his or her own project, which must be "law-related" insofar as it substantially utilizes the legal training and skills of the graduate. In addition, the fellow must partner with a "public interest" organization.² Applications are due on February 28, 2011, and a fellow will be selected by April 1, 2011 by Toll Public Interest Center Advisory Board members. The fellowship carries a stipend of \$42,500 plus benefits (to be provided through sponsoring organization). Recipients are also eligible for the *Penn Law Toll Loan Repayment Assistance Program (TollRAP)*.

Fellowship Application Procedure:

Applications must be received electronically (PDF preferred) no later than **Monday, February 28, 2011 at 5:00 p.m.** Applications should be emailed to tor@law.upenn.edu. Late applications will not be considered.

Applicants should submit the following:

1. An Application Cover Page.
2. A current résumé.
3. A personal statement (no more than 3 double spaced pages) that describes your relevant experience, interests, future goals with respect to public interest work, and any other reasons the committee should consider awarding you this fellowship.
4. A description of your project (no more than 6 double spaced pages). Please discuss why this project is important to the community you propose to serve. Please tell us about any other organization that may be doing the type of work you propose, or alternatively, discuss the gap in service that currently exists in your proposed area. Finally, please discuss in detail your goals for the year.
5. A description of your partnering organization that details its mission and work, and how it can help you fulfill the goals of your project.

¹ The Delaware Valley, as defined as the planning area of the Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission, includes the following counties: Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Montgomery and Philadelphia in Pennsylvania; and Burlington, Camden, Mercer and Gloucester in New Jersey.

² A public interest organization is defined as: any nonprofit organization or institution whose primary purpose is to serve or advocate on behalf of individuals or organizations whose interests, for various economic, political or social reasons, are not adequately represented by the private sector or the government. Preference will be given to applicants who propose cross-disciplinary approaches to social justice issues.

6. One letter of support from your sponsoring organization, and two letters of recommendation from professors or past employers who can speak to your work in public interest.

The Advisory Board Fellowship Selection Committee will review all applications and select applicants they wish to interview. Interviews will be scheduled in March, and a Fellow will be selected by April 1, 2011.
