

Miriam Enriquez, Senior Counsel, Comcast

Enriquez currently holds the position of Senior Counsel at Comcast Cable focusing on investigations and law enforcement matters. In her role, she investigates integrity complaints and helps in building a culture of ethical conduct as an integral part of how the company conducts business. She is part of a team that designs and implements policies and procedures to assure compliance with all applicable laws, regulations and the company's Code of Conduct.

Prior to working at Comcast, Enriquez served as Philadelphia Mayor Jim Kenney's appointed Director of the Office of Immigrant Affairs from the start of his administration until September of 2019. In that role, she was responsible for providing overall strategic advice on the administration's policy agenda linked to immigrants, refugees, law enforcement and criminal justice. She was responsible for recommending and developing key programs and policies that allowed immigrants to successfully integrate into the civic, economic, and social fabric of the City. This work included citizenship initiatives, deportation defense, municipal IDs, language access, immigrant workers rights, workforce development, cultural programs and community outreach. Enriquez was part of a team that made key decisions in federal immigration litigation including *The City of Philadelphia v. Sessions*, in which the City of Philadelphia was successful in keeping the Department of Justice from withholding crucial federal funding. In order to guarantee that immigrants always have a voice within city government, Enriquez worked on legislation which made the Office of Immigrant Affairs a permanent part of City government by providing an amendment to the Philadelphia Home Rule Charter.

Before joining the Office of Immigrant Affairs, Enriquez served as City Councilman-at-Large Dennis M. O'Brien's Director of Legislation and Policy where she was instrumental in crafting and passing landmark legislation to protect immigration services consumers in the City. This legislation has since served as a model for other jurisdictions in Pennsylvania, Georgia, Colorado and Texas. Prior to her work on City Council, Enriquez served as an Assistant District Attorney at the Philadelphia District Attorney's Office for seven years. She advocated for countless victims and successfully prosecuted thousands of misdemeanor and felony cases, impacting every city neighborhood. Enriquez was a pioneer prosecutor in the Gun Violence Task Force, where she fought tirelessly against gun trafficking in Philadelphia.

Enriquez earned her Bachelor of Arts degree with distinction from George Mason University and her law degree from The Dickinson School of Law, Pennsylvania State University. Enriquez was born in the United States but spent much of her childhood living in several different Latin American countries, including her family's country of origin, Nicaragua.
